

Toronto Railway Museum (TRM) to host Doors Open Toronto, Unveil Four Railway Murals on May 27 and May 28

Toronto, ON - The Toronto Railway Museum (TRM) today announced a Doors Open Event taking place **Saturday, May 27** and **Sunday, May 28.** The event will be held at the Toronto Railway Museum inside Stalls 15-17 of the John Street Roundhouse, and outside in Roundhouse Park. Activities run from 10:00 am to 5:00 pm and admission is free for the entire weekend!

Visitors can expect live music, guided tours, a model train show, park animations, and the unveiling of four new art installations within Roundhouse Park. The museum store located in Don Station will also be open during the event. An opening reception including remarks from TRM employees, volunteers, and partners will take place on **Saturday, May 27 at 12:00 pm**.

"TRM is proud to unveil four new murals illustrating Toronto's railway connection," said Mario Chiofolo, Chair of the Toronto Railway Museum's Marketing Committee. "The railways play an essential role in how we connect to one another, and how we see our city. Each of the four murals call viewers to reflect on their own personal ties to the rails and we're excited to see all the ways museum visitors experience the art."

Doors Open Toronto showcases some of the most architecturally, culturally and socially significant sites across the city. This includes the Toronto Railway Museum, which first opened its doors in 2010.
