#### Vision




#### History

The Toronto Railway Museum was opened by the Toronto Railway Historical Association in 2010. Over the past 15 years the organization has grown into a year-round, professionally staffed organization operating out of the John Street Roundhouse National Historic Site across from the CN Tower.

#### Attendance and Reach

Museum attendance grew more than 15% year over year. The growth is attributed to a great turnout for Doors Open Toronto and more visitors returning to downtown Toronto for sports games, conventions, and cultural events.






## **OPERATIONS**

#### Mini Train

The mini train operated for 82 days in 2024, traveling more than 1,000 kilometers around Roundhouse Park. Train rides departed Wednesday-Sunday from May through October. Ridership rebounded as tourism in Toronto increased following the pandemic restrictions of the early 2020s. A special thank you to our Museum volunteers who maintain the track and rolling stock to keep our popular attractions running throughout the season.

## **OPERATIONS**

#### **Guided Tours**

Tour guides provided more than 520 tours of the rolling stock in Roundhouse Park in 2024. Our summer staff provided daily "Tales of the Rails" tours as part of admission to the museum. These tours included access to TH&B and Cape Race, allowing visitors to go inside the rolling stock on display in the park. A second tour experience was offered by our volunteer Robert. He gave regular locomotive tours of 6213, providing visitors with an indepth look at our popular steam locomotive.

Throughout the summer, our volunteers offered rides on the handcar across the turntable. In November, the Museum welcomed Taylor Swift fans from the Rogers Centre onto the "turn tay-able" as part of the concert festivities in Roundhouse Park. Guests enjoyed riding on the turntable while it rotated to Taylor's most popular tunes playing next door at Steam Whistle.

#### **Don Station Renovation**

New shelving was installed in the TRM Shop at Don Station in March 2025. The new layout was designed by Regina Sheung and fabricated by Crispe Design & Construction. The contemporary design protects the heritage elements of the 1896 train station while maximizing floor space for customers.

## **RESTORATION & MAINTENANCE**

#### **Rolling Stock**

CN Van 79144 and locomotive 4803 were the focus of the restoration crew in 2024. New security doors were added and a fresh coat of paint was added to the inside and outside of CN Van. 4803 was brought inside in November and rust removal and paint began.

#### **Track Maintenance**

Over the winter two switches from Don Station were brought inside to be repaired. The switches were reinstalled in the spring, allowing for the mini train to use both sets of tracks, increasing the operational capacity for future seasons.




# **VOLUNTEERS**
